
Quick Facts about the State of Behavioral Health in Ohio



Demand for behavioral health services **increased 353%** from 2013-2019 while the workforce only increased **174%**

Nearly 2.4 Million

Number of Ohioans who live in communities that do not have enough behavioral health professionals.



Overdose and Suicide: Each day 19 Ohioans die prematurely from unintentional overdose and suicide, ranking these conditions alongside cancer, heart disease, and diabetes as leading causes of death in Ohio.

Nearly 550,000 children ages 3-17 in Ohio have one or more emotional, behavioral, or developmental conditions

Estimated Prevalence of Mental Health Issues among Adults in Ohio




Figure 1b. Percent Change in Predicted 12 Month-ending Count of Drug Overdose Deaths, by Jurisdiction: December 2021 to December 2022 Select predicted or reported number of deaths Predicted Reported New York City Percent Change for United States District of Columbia Ohio -5.59 Legend for Percent Change in Drug Overdose Deaths Between 12-Month Ending Periods

PREVENTION ACROSS THE LIFESPAN

- •Schools: OhioMHAS in partnership with ODE and Miami University, created a Student Assistance Program model, the Ohio School Wellness Initiative, and piloted it in over 70 schools. The School Wellness Coordinators' role is to provide early intervention supports and connections to care when needed
- •Youth: Ohio Youth Led Prevention Network and Adult Alliethe Ohio Youth Led Prevention Network (OYLPN) is a vital part of the state's prevention infrastructure to prevent substance use and promote health and wellbeing. Ohio's Adult Allies support and facilitate programming with the middle and high school youth.
- •Higher Ed: Rise and Thrive Ohio's Rise & Thrive Campus Collaborative has encouraged Higher Ed campus community connections to ensure that students and staff have access to wellness centers or community behavioral health, regardless of campus resources.
- •Older Adults: The Older Adult Behavioral Health & Wellness Project is focused on empowering older adults to make healthy lifestyle choices and navigate use of medications and alcohol with the evidence program Wellness Initiative for Senior Education (WISE).
- •Community Coalitions: Currently, there are over 175 community coalitions in Ohio, many of which include substance use prevention in their goals. The new launch of coalition Institute is bringing science ased practice to new and existing coalitions to enhance effectiveness within communities.



HARNESSING STATE OPIOID AND STIMULANT (SOS) FEDERAL FUNDS

SINCE 2019, NEARLY 38,000 OHIOANS HAVE BEEN SERVED THROUGHERANTS PROGRAMS, AND OHIO IS PERFORMING CONSISTENTLY OR ABOVE NATIONAL OUTCOMES.



FENTANYL TEST STRIPS






Governor Mike DeWine signed a bill into law January 3, 2023, decriminalizing the fentanyl test strips that detect fentanyl and its analogues in drugs. The law took effect in April.



Continuing the Fight Against Addiction

Providing a Continuum of Care for people with opiate use disorders across the criminal justice system:

Incarcerated adults at Ohio's prisons can now start MAT in the form of methadone and buprenorphine upon arrival at prison, expanding upon existing community treatment and reentry-based MAT services.

Peer Support training is also now available in Ohio's prisons, and incarcerated men and women are delivering peer support as part of the broader counseling and recovery strategy.




